
WIT School of Education

- WIT is a third level institution with over 10,000 students based in the south east of Ireland
- The Institute has six Schools representing different disciplines
- The School of Education is one of six schools within WIT
- The School provides a suite of programmes designed for those working within the education sector
- The Literacy Development Centre is based in the School of Education and manages the WIT/NALA Accreditation project which provides third level qualifications for those working within the Adult Literacy sector in Ireland




Background to WIT/NALA Project

- Literacy Services with varied levels of provision
- No structures in place for personnel working in the sector
- No defined qualifications or career paths
- No permanent positions within the services
- Issues relating to the quality of literacy provision and training provided to both volunteers and paid staff
- Question of changing what was a volunteer based movement into a more structured service that was based in the formal education system in Ireland
- The issue of adult literacy had largely been ignored by mainstream politicians and educationalists





Background to WIT/NALA Project

- During the 1990's much lobbying was done by NALA to highlight the issues relating to adult literacy
- The government department (Department of Education & Science) agreed to fund the development of a third level qualification for adult literacy organisers
- WIT was chosen as the third level institute that NALA would work with to develop this initial programme
- This has been a unique partnership between a third level institute and a national state agency






- **Overview**
- **Qualifications designed for those working in the Literacy Sector**
- 1995 WIT and the Irish National Adult Literacy Agency collaborated to offer the first third level qualification for Literacy Organisers working in the adult literacy sector
- In 1998 the need for an equivalent qualification for Literacy tutors was recognised and a Certificate level course was subsequently validated by the NCEA
- Programmes have undergone a number of changes as a result of consultation with key stakeholders over the past 8 years
- Stakeholder input into the evolution of all programmes offered by the Literacy Development Centre at WIT has been central to their development


Today the project is based in WIT and a dedicated project team manage the development and delivery of programmes


- **The project is fully funded by the Department of Education & Science**




■ **Rationale**

- The objective of the programmes is to ensure that those working in the sector are equipped with the requisite teaching and organisational skills required to address the adult literacy issue in Ireland – IALS and OECD (1997) reports indicated 25% of Irish adults were at literacy level 1 and a further 23% at literacy level 2
- The programme design is based on adult learning principles
- The programme is designed to provide a 3rd level teaching qualification to practitioners working in the literacy field
- Programmes have drawn from national and international best practice in literacy learning and tuition and adult basic education



Higher Certificate in Arts in Literacy Development

- **Programme Structure**
- NQAI Level 6 qualification (Bologna short cycle)
- 12 modules to be completed – mix of mandatory and elective modules
- Duration – approximately 26 months
- Each module is supported by 35 teaching hours delivered in blocs of 3 days (6 days in total per module) with approximately 75 hours self directed study per module
- Assessment is varied and comprises project work, presentation, peer review, essay work, reflective learning journals and practical work related exercises
- Participants may opt to take a small number of modules per year and build up credits over time

Bachelor of Arts in Adult Education (Ordinary)

- Developed in 2000
- Allows for progression from the Higher Certificate programme
- Recognised at level 7 on the Irish qualifications framework (first cycle on Bologna framework)
- Contains both generic modules and modules specific to adult literacy
- Takes approximately 15 months to complete







Bachelor of Arts in Adult Education (Honours)

- Launched in 2006
- Designed for learners who have completed the level 7 B.A. in Adult Education
- Is comprised of an additional 16 months study
- Recognised at level 8 on the Irish quality framework (Bologna first cycle)
- Gives participants the same level of qualification (Honours degree) as teachers working in the Vocational education sector








